"Leaving a Legacy"

⁹ In the twentieth year of King Jeroboam of Israel, Asa began to reign over Judah; ¹⁰ he reigned forty-one years in Jerusalem. His mother's name was Maacah daughter of Abishalom. ¹¹ Asa did what was right in the sight of the LORD, as his father David had done. 1 Kings 15:9-11

Several years ago, I went to two different events by Promise Keepers, an evangelical men's organization founded in 1990 by Coach Bill McCartney of Colorado University. One event was in Washington, DC, and the other in Philadelphia. At one event, the theme was "Leaving a Legacy". I think that originally the message was supposed to be one of encouraging participants (all men) to live a Godly life and thereby leave that legacy to their sons and daughters. This was not a legacy to be measured in portfolio dollars or rooms in a mansion or acres of land. It was a legacy of a good and Godly character.

Asa was the son of Abijam, who was the son of Rehoboam, who was the son of Solomon, who was the son of David. Contrary to the examples of his father, grandfather and great grandfather, Asa followed the example set by David.

I particularly remember one speaker who expanded on this theme in his presentation. He said that he had come to realize that all the choices we make build the legacy that we leave behind. Whether our lives have been Godly or not, whether we have been an example of how to live or how not to live, whether we have shown love to others or not, how we have lived our lives is the legacy that we leave behind. It can be a good legacy or a bad legacy. The issue is not whether each of us will leave a character-based and faith-based legacy or not. The issue that each of us has to decide is what kind of legacy do we want to leave, because assuredly we will leave some type of legacy.

God of Faith, guide us to live our lives to be a faithful example and legacy to our children, our grandchildren, our great grandchildren and others who look to us for guidance. Amen.

All are welcome so that together we might encourage and challenge one another on the hard road that is Christian discipleship.


Second Saturday Cinema, in June, 2023:
