"Called to Serve"

⁵This proposal [of the Apostles to add more leader-servants to the disciples] pleased the whole group. They chose Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit; also Philip, Procorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolas from Antioch, a convert to Judaism. ⁶They presented these men to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them. Acts 6:5-6

Beginning on the Day of Pentecost, the fellowship of those who believed that the Promised One, the Messiah, had come to earth as the person Jesus of Nazareth, grew and grew and grew. The original leaders, the Apostles, were being stretched thin with more and more responsibilities. Earlier they had added Matthias to replace the traitor, Judas; but the number and extent of the tasks had become overwhelming.

They proposed that a new leadership position be added to address pastoral care needs of the growing congregation. Seven were chosen, or rather called by the Holy Spirit, for this new responsibility. The names as recorded in Acts

are Greek; six of them, presumably, must have been born into Jewish families. The last in the list was a convert to Judaism.

As any congregation, the Protestant Fellowship needs individuals who likewise feel called service in some capacity. We all have gifts and talents for service – some can sing in the choir, some can play the piano or organ, some are wonderful greeting worshipers and making them feel welcome, so are



gifted to work with audio visual equipment in the booth, some are at ease speaking to the congregation, some are able to convey God's message to others, some are called to be leaders to guide and minister to others.

We all have gifts for service; and we may not be aware of some of them.

God, Who calls us to service, hear my prayer for discernment that I may realize how you have blessed me for service to others and grant me the will to step forward and accept your Call, in the name of Jesus. Amen.
