"The Gift of Grace"

¹⁵ But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. ... ¹⁷ If, because of the one man's trespass, death reigned through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

Romans 5:15, 17

What is this "Grace" that Paul is addressing in his Epistle to the Romans? Sometimes we may be like the lawyer who wanted to know if he was living a godly life. Jesus asked him about the Law, that is, what is said in Deuteronomy and Leviticus. The lawyer answered correctly, and then, just to be sure he was doing everything correctly, he asked who was his neighbor.

So, do we ever ask what we have to do to earn this "Grace" that Paul talks about? In the beginning of chapter 5, Paul assures us that our faith in Jesus Christ is what justifies us, that is, reconciles and restores us to a right relationship with God. And this faith gives us access to God's Grace. The Epistle of James instructs us that we need to do good works as evidence of our faith; faith without works or good deeds is not real faith; perhaps it is just knowledge.

Faith is hard to understand; there are many questions that faith does not answer. What exactly will the pearly gates look like; will they be made of real pearl; how big was the oyster that made the pearl? These may be some of the questions. Can you imagine God (a patient fatherly older gentleman) nodding and answering each question with "That is an interesting question. Why do you need to know?"

At Christmas time, many of us like to pick up gifts and shake them to guess what is wrapped so beautifully. God's Grace may not be that type of physical gift. Grace is offered and we can choose to take it.

God of Amazing Grace, Guide us to accept Your indescribable gift to each of us each day. Guide us to treasure Your Grace as we live our lives looking forward to sharing in Your Glory. In the Name of the Promised One who came pay the spiritual debts of us all.
