WOMEN'S PLACE IN THE DEFENSE OF ISRAEL

As we watch the weeks of pain unfold in Israel and Gaza, we see the Israeli Army, both male and female members raise to the occasion. Against the evils of Hamas. The defense of Israel rests in the hands of dedicated soldiers, male and female, from multiple walks of life and age groups. We can't help but identify with parents and grandparents who currently watch their families torn by the need to defend Israel and its citizens.

History of Women in Israeli Military: Since its inception and to this very day, Israel is one of only ten nations that conscripts both males and females, with only Norway and Sweden with equal gender selections. The following have some differences in exemptions and length of service: Israel (women are almost 40% of those drafted yearly), of Myanmar, Eritrea, Libya, Malaysa, North Korea, Peru, Tunisia. Yet all these countries, beyond Israel do not depend so heavily on both genders, as we now see in Israel.

The history of women's conscription dates back before the formal establishment of the country in 1948. The Hagenah opened its lines to "Every Jewish male or female who is prepared and trained to fulfill the obligation of national defense." In the 1940s, women filled 30% of military positions in security, weapons transport, and manned anti-aircraft posts. They often traveled from Tel Aviv to Jerusalen with weapons concealed in their clothing. Nine female platoon leaders and female squad commanders distinguished themselves during the winter of 1948.

Although women served as instructors, nurses, clerks, and telephone operators, they were occasionally trained and flew air transport missions in the 1950s. Then, rapidly growing need required greater dependency on females. During the 1973 Arab-Israeli War, women filled the field positions. In 1986, Amira Dotan became the first female Brigadier General, and ICF female captain Or, Na'aman ordered the Patriot Missile battery against Syria's drones. In 2001, Roni Zuckerman was the first female Israeli fighter pilot, leading to full-fledged body of women fighter pilots and combat soldiers by 2006 Lebanon War.

The year 2011 provided many changes and openings for Israeli female warriors. Two women were elevated to positions on the General Staff and in 2014, several other changes occurred: Oshrat Bacher received the appointment as Israel's first female combat-battalion commander; the first female doctor was appointed to an elite unit; female *kashrut* supervisors worked in kitchens on military basis. The Caracal Battalion, in which 70% of the troops were women combatants, reached prominence in battle, and women serve as tank crews in Israel border defense until today, along Egypt and Jordan borders.

Service Requirements: In the event you are interested in joining the IDF, the following are the standards which you must follow: Mandatory service for Jewish-Israeli women is 24 months, but certain specific roles require 30 months. Females who arrive in Israel at or after age 17 are generally exempt from conscription, but they may volunteer. In 2013, a transgender woman served in the military as a female soldier. In 2020, 55% of eligible women were drafted into Israel Defense Forces (IDF); 35% were exempted for religious (Orthodox) reasons.

Exemption Requirements: Religious exemptions are available for those who feel they cannot participate: Marriage, pregnancy, motherhood, maintaining laws of *Kashrut*, no travel on *Shabbat*. Today, women in Israel have the option of applying for those previous listed exemptions when

called into service. Initially, those who have valid reasons are directed into a service called *Sherut Leumi*, a combat support alternative that is particularly popular with Arab women citizens. As of 2022, IDF had 169,500 active troops and was the 28th largest military in the world. It also has 465,000 reserve personnel who are added to the force in times of need, like today!

The Caracal Battalion (33rd Battalion): This famous coed infantry battalion in the Israel Defense Forces is part of the Sagi Regional Brigade in the Southern Command. The battalion badge bears the Caracal cat and a sickle and sword to symbolize the connection between the two groups. It is comprised of one-third men and two-thirds women. As of 2021, the battalion has drawn volunteer female soldiers from Los Angeles, New York in North America and Montreal and Ottawa in Canada. Their uniform includes a light green beret and red boots.

One of the many questions in the battle-hardened, male-dominated military that creep into a conversation about women warriors is whether men fully trust women with their lives. Israel has examined the work of the Caracal Battalion and concluded that the women have performed in an outstanding fashion. In fact, nearly 50% of current Israeli lieutenants and captains are women. According to Captain Yaron Eyal, "I really, really trust them...to watch my back...."

Today's Military: Today, although nearly 50% of the IDF's lieutenants and captains are women, males still dominate the upper echelons of the military. The highest-ranking female officer in 2023 is a major general in charge of personnel. But it seems to be understood that chief of staff will always be a man. According to Miri Eisen, retired colonel, after 20 years in the military: "We won't have a female chief of staff. The glass ceiling is there for a variety of reasons," Eisen says. "The military is a boys' club. I think every military is a boy's club. It's still a majority of men who are going to choose that way of life."

So, folks, join me with prayers and appreciation for the women and, of course, the men who are dedicated to destroying Hamas and all those who perpetrate hate and destruction in Israel.
