"Water"

¹ When God began to create the heavens and the earth, ² the earth was complete chaos, and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters.

Genesis 1:1-2

After God gave us the concept of light, God made the best use of water. At first, water was in one big mass, but God separated it between the sky and the ground; it was separated again into dry land and masses of flowing water. It seems to be always moving—from streams to rivers to seas and oceans. Some water seems to be still enough so that deer and other animals can come and drink in peace. Yes, there was a time God blew the waters of the Red Sea into a channel: the children of Israel fled from Egypt on dry land and 40 years later into the Promised Land. Another time God used a storm to cause sailors to throw Jonah overboard so that he could land in a big fish. Consider how large the sea and the fish were! Deserts cover lots of land, but God has provided oases for people and animals.

Yes, the waters keep moving, but God replenishes them with the system of snow and rain in the mountains. The snow has its season for melting and running into an appropriate body of water. We get dew many mornings to refresh our vegetation. This dew system worked until God brought the rains to flood the earth.

God used the moving waters to let the disciples and others to preach to the utter parts of the Mediterranean world. Paul experienced a shipwreck or two, but always the sailors had a story to tell about God's powerful works. God used water in baptism to wash away our sins. Jesus promised living water to the woman at the well.

At the end of time, so says Revelation, there will be no more sea since all evil was cast into it (Rev 21:1). We won't need water to praise God. In the meantime, let us use our water to good advantage and protect it. We people waste water when we let it run when shaving or brushing our teeth. Too often we plant grass or crops that use too much water for their setting. We allow cattle to pollute the streams when they should be held back; the land, not the water, needs their gifts. Our mines, urban ash/trash, and smoke particles also pollute.

God, we thank you for water. Help us to use it wisely for your kingdom. Amen.




Spotlight on Mission - Support a Local Food Bank:
