### "Creation"

<sup>1</sup> When God began to create the heavens and the earth, ... Genesis 1:1

The book of Genesis has always fascinated me. Where did we come from? I am not as knowledgeable as I would like to be, but I do a lot of reading. As I understand it, for many years it was generally thought that our universe- the one we inhabit - was static and had always existed. Feel free to correct me if I am wrong. Then astronomers were able to build bigger and better telescopes, more powerful and able to reveal more and more of the information that was not previously available. (Psalm 8) Now, I can only remember in my mind's eye the vast expanse of starlit space, and some have never seen it at all. Sad!

Today, we are obsessed with questions and suggestions about UFOs, aliens from space, and other planets that we can't understand. So far, it seems that our planet Earth is alone in the universe. We are God's creation and can marvel at that fact.

Hand-Made Greeting Card Outreach: This Community Outreach group creates handmade cards for special holidays and occasions. We meet on the




