



Jewish Contributions to the Harlem Renaissance



As they chased the good life in the 1920's and '30's, Americans searched for new ways to spend their leisure time. Harlem became an arts mecca for the full flowering of African-American culture. Jazz was its key emblem. Jazz was found everywhere: in speakeasies, dancehalls, homes, even in railroad cars. George Gershwin and Milton Berle (Mr. Television) frequented Harlem's cathedral of entertainment, the Apollo Theater where Ella Fitzgerald made her debut in 1934. In the Savoy Ballroom, owned by the Jewish businessman, Moe Gale, the battling bands of Chick Webb and Count Basie squared off against each other while 2,000 couples danced the Lindy Hop. Historians usually focus on antagonisms between Blacks and Jews during the period of the Harlem Renaissance. Yet significant strides toward racial equity were made by Sophie Tucker, Benny Goodman and other great Jewish entertainers. Aided by a wide range of rare and pleasurable music videos, Karl Middleman tells the story of the glorious music of the Harlem Renaissance with a focus on contributions by Jews to the cause of improving race relations.



Karl Middleman is equally at home with Rodgers and Hammerstein as he is with Handel and Haydn. He has been hailed for the easy ways his presentations mix scholarship with showmanship. Peppered with possibilities for participation, Maestro Karl's presentations demonstrate that teaching classical music need not be rarified and exclusionary, but fun and fulfilling.
