¹ The word that came to Jeremiah from the LORD: ² "Come, go down to the potter's house, and there I will let you hear my words." ³ So I went down to the potter's house, and there he was working at his wheel. ⁴ The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him.

Jeremiah 18:1-4

How many of you who are reading this meditation think that this is a peculiar scripture for Advent? You are correct – it is a peculiar.

This was part of the scripture reading on August 31 in St. John's UMC. In the verses that follow the ones above, God explains to Jeremiah that He can do to any nation the same thing that the potter does to the clay. He can break that nation and destroy it; and He can change His mind and not destroy. He can plan to do good for a nation that listens to His voice; however, if that nation does not listen to God's voice, He can change His mind about doing good. Further, the people of Judah and Jerusalem have not listened to God's voice.

While I have read and heard this scripture several times, on August 31 two items especially stood out for me. First, the clay used by the potter is not sentient; it does not think and make decisions on its own. Second, the potter does not throw away the clay from the ruined work-in-progress; instead, he reuses it.

Contrary to inanimate clay, the Israelites were capable of changing their ways. And, as Jeremiah saw what was done with the clay, God was going to bring hard times to the people of Judah and Jerusalem

In addition, and perhaps more important is the point that the potter does not discard the ruined clay. Instead, the potter keeps using it in order to shape a new object. And, extending the analogy, God is not going to discard the people of Judah and Jerusalem.

That is a great source of Hope!

No matter how much God's chosen people disappointed Him, He was not going to discard them. Yes, He was going chastise them and punish them; but the purpose for those actions was (and is today) based on His love for them.

I think this source of Hope cannot be repeated too often!

The purpose was (and is today) to get them to turn and follow Him. His purpose was (and is today) for them to be His people in the world.

God of Hope, we thank you for continuing to work on us and to shape us to be Your people in this world so that we can share Your Love in the world.

In Jesus' name, Amen.
